# Introduction

First, I want to say **Thank You** so much for spending your hard-earned money on this crafting e-book. I'm so excited for you to have all of these animal crafts at your fingertips! Kids love using paper and glue to make art and I love being able to provide easy solutions to make that happen. Thank you again and enjoy!

## **How to Get the Most out of this E-Book**

The highlight of this e-book is, of course, the **craft templates**. I do not recommend printing all of the pages at once. Instead, choose which craft you will make and print the corresponding instructions and template.

Some of the crafts contain links to videos. Just click on the link and the video will open in your computer's web browser. If you hold the "Ctrl" button as you click, it will open in a new window.

**Also, every item in the Table of Contents is clickable.**

## **The Secrets of the Stapler**

The first crafting secret I'd like to share is: that **you can staple your templates to craft paper instead of tracing them!** Just print out the template, staple it to the correct color paper and cut out your craft shapes. Boom! You're ready to make your craft.

Now, are you ready for the **BEST SECRET**? Did you know that **you can staple together 10 pieces of copy paper and cut out 10 shapes at a time?**! That's my **BIG SECRET** to fast & easy crafting.

**If you want to make a craft with a group of kids**, you can staple the template to up to 10 sheets of copy paper, 5 sheets of cardstock or 6-10 sheets of construction paper. The key is the staples (and using good scissors)!

While you're cutting out the craft shapes, if you've cut off all parts of the pages that have staples, make sure to re-staple the sheets that are left. **Whenever you're cutting multiple sheets at a time, make sure they are always stapled together.**

**With these Stapler Secrets, you'll be a crafting wiz in no time!**

All of the crafts in this e-book are made of paper and have a very similar material lists. The following is a complete list of the materials for every craft in this e-book:

## Used In Every Craft:

- craft template (**every craft comes with a template for you to print**)
- construction paper and sometimes cardstock or copy paper
- scissors (for cutting out craft shapes)
- stapler (this is included in the material lists so that you can staple the template to the craft paper instead of tracing it)
- glue sticks and sometimes white glue
- markers and crayons (almost every craft, mostly for drawing faces)

## Used Less Frequently and Often Optional:

- craft punchers (so you're not always cutting out circles by hand - Giraffe & Butterfly)
- optional fun extras: glitter, stickers, sequins, pom poms, feathers, confetti and more

# Easy Paper Lion



- Lion Template (below)
- construction paper, colored copy paper, or colored cardstock
- scissors
- stapler
- glue sticks
- marker (for face)

## **Print the Template and Cut Out the Lion Shapes**



Once you have the template printed, separate the pages based on the final lion color. Then, staple each template to multiple sheets of construction paper and cut out all of the shapes you need.




**I recommend having a lion that is already put together so the children can see what the final version will look like.**


1. start with the yellow body





# Cute Paper Tiger


This easy paper tiger craft is perfect for teaching children about zoo animals. They will love drawing on all of the stripes. Did you know that no two tigers have the same stripes? Ask children if they know the difference between a tiger (stripes) and a leopard (spots).



## Materials

- Paper Tiger Template (below)
- construction paper, colored copy paper, or colored cardstock
- scissors
- stapler
- glue sticks
- marker (for face and stripes)

## **Print the Template and Cut Out the Tiger Shapes**



Once you have the template printed out, staple each template to multiple sheets of construction paper and cut out all of the shapes you need.

## How to Assemble



**I recommend having a tiger that is already put together so the children can see what the final version will look like.**


1. Start with the orange body.
2. Glue the head onto the orange body.
3. Glue the white muzzle onto the bottom of the head.
4. Glue on the nose.
5. Draw on the face.
6. Draw triangles all over the tiger's body and color them in to make stripes.
7. Don't forget to write your name on the back.







# Bear Craft


Lions, and tigers and bears, oh my! This bear is very simple and would be a perfect craft to do while reading "Goldilocks and the Three Bears" or singing "Going on a Bear Hunt".



## Materials

- Bear Template (below)
- construction paper, colored copy paper, or colored cardstock
- scissors
- stapler
- glue sticks
- marker (for face and ears)

## Print the Template and Cut Out the Bear Shapes



Once you have the template printed out, staple each template to multiple sheets of construction paper and cut out all of the shapes you need.

**Tip:** While you're cutting, if you've cut off all parts of the pages that have staples, make sure to re-staple the sheets that are left. **Whenever you're cutting multiple sheets at a time, make sure they are always stapled together.**

## How to Assemble



**I recommend having a completed bear so the children can see what the final version will look like.**

1. Glue the head onto the body.
2. Glue the white muzzle onto the bottom of the head.
3. Glue on the black nose.
4. Draw on the face with a marker
5. Don't forget to write your name on the back



# Cool Giraffe Craft

This giraffe craft is cool because it's two layers. Kids will love punching holes for the giraffe spots into the yellow top layer. And then gluing the yellow layer on top of the brown layer and seeing the giraffe magically appear. It's a fun craft to make while reading "Giraffes Can't Dance" by Giles Andreae.



## Materials

- Giraffe Template (below)
- construction paper, colored copy paper, or colored cardstock
- scissors
- stapler
- craft hole punchers
- glue sticks
- black marker for the face

## **Print the Template and Cut Out the Giraffe Shapes**




Once you have the template printed, separate the pages based on the final craft colors. Then, staple each template to multiple sheets of construction paper and cut out all of the shapes you need

## Decide if you will pre-punch the holes or leave it for the kids

The fun and cool part about this craft is the layering of the brown and yellow paper. If you have enough hole punchers, it would be great to let the kids punch the holes to make the giraffe spots (see image). If not, you may want to punch the holes before bringing this craft to your crew of kids.



**If you do not have a hole punch,** you also have the option of cutting out multiple brown circles and having the kids glue on the spots. The yellow and brown paper can still be layered for the hooves, horns and nose.

Each child should have three pieces:

1. brown (back piece)
2. yellow (front piece)
3. brown tail

They will also need a black crayon or marker to draw on the face and ears.

## How to Assemble



**I recommend having a giraffe that is already put together so the children can see what the final version will look like.**

1. Draw on the giraffe's eyes and ears.
2. Punch large holes into the yellow piece of the giraffe. **Make sure you DO NOT punch holes where the eyes will go.**
3. Optional: punch small holes into the yellow part of the giraffe.
4. Lay the yellow part on top of the brown part and draw on the nose and mouth.
5. Cut small strips in the tip of the tail to make it look like hair (optional). Then glue the brown tail to the back of the giraffe.
6. Glue the yellow giraffe shape on top of the brown giraffe shape. The brown paper should show through the holes in the yellow paper to make spots. The brown paper will also make the hoofs, nose, and antlers.
7. Don't forget to write your name on the back!

And you're finished!



**Step 1:** Draw on the Giraffe's eyes and ears.



**Step 2:** Punch large holes into the yellow part of the giraffe.



**Step 3:** Punch small holes into the yellow part of the giraffe.



**Step 4:** lay the yellow part on top of the brown part and draw on the nose and mouth.




**Step 5:** Glue on the tail.



**Step 6:** Glue the yellow top layer onto the brown bottom layer of the giraffe. Don't forget to write your name on the back. And you're finished!

# Easy Butterfly Craft

Check out these awesome butterflies! Butterflies aren't just for girls, you can also make a very cool butterfly as a boy craft. These butterflies are an easy spring or summer craft. Read the classic book "The Very Hungry Caterpillar" by Eric Carle or try the fun book "The Very Impatient Caterpillar" by Ross Burach while making this craft.



## Materials

- Butterfly template (below)
- construction paper, colored copy paper, or colored cardstock
- scissors
- stapler
- crafting hole punchers (optional, although highly recommended)
- glue sticks
- black marker (for face)

## Print the Template and Cut Out the Butterfly Shapes



Once you have the templates printed, staple them to multiple sheets of construction paper and cut out all of the shapes you need.

You can also use crafting hole

punchers to cut out the circles. You will need a large circle and a smaller one.

Again, make sure you're punching holes in more than one sheet at a time! If you don't have a hole punch, just cut out the circles by hand.



## Cut out the Butterfly Antenna

I did not include the butterfly antenna in the template. These are easy to cut on your own. First, stack multiple sheets of colored paper (use the scraps from cutting out the larger shapes).

Then, just cut out small rectangles. You'll have enough antenna in no time. **Just remember, you need two antennae for each butterfly.**


## How to Assemble

The kids will just need to glue it all together and make it their own!




1. Glue the body on top of and in the center of the wings.
2. Glue circles to the wings.
3. Glue the antenna behind the head.
4. Use a marker to draw on a face and decorate your butterfly with sunglasses, silly faces, or cool designs on the wings.
5. Don't forget to write your name on the back.

Check out this simple Bald Eagle craft! Kids will love making it. It's a great craft for American patriotic holidays (Fourth of July, Memorial Day, Labor Day, Veterans Day) OR leave off the stars and just have fun making this majestic bird with your crew of kids.



## Materials

- Eagle Template (below)
- construction paper, colored copy paper, or colored cardstock
- scissors
- stapler
- glue sticks
- marker (for eyes)

## **Print the Template and Cut Out the Eagle Shapes**



Once you have the template printed, separate the pages based on the final craft colors. Then, staple each template to multiple sheets of construction paper and cut out all of the shapes you need

## How to Assemble



**I recommend having a completed eagle so the children can see what the final version will look like.**

1. Glue the tail behind the body.
2. Glue the head onto the top of the body.
3. Glue the wings onto the back of the body.
4. Glue on the beak.
5. Optional: glue on the stars.
6. Draw on the eyes.
7. Don't forget to write your name on the back.



# Happy Shark Craft


Check out this simple and cute paper shark! It's a perfect craft to make while singing "Baby Shark" or learning all about the Ocean. Did you know that sharks are a type of fish? And a group of sharks is called a shiver? Make this craft while reading "Shark vs. Train" by Chris Barton or "Shark Lady" by Jess Keating.



## Materials

- Happy Shark Template (below)
- construction paper, colored copy paper, or colored cardstock
- scissors
- stapler
- glue sticks

## Print the Template and Cut Out the Shark Shapes



Once you have the template printed, separate the pages based on the final craft colors. Then, staple each template to multiple sheets of construction paper and cut out all of the shapes you need.

The shark appears to be on gray paper, but it's actually the standard light blue that comes in a construction paper pack.

## Cut Out the Eyes or Use Googly Eyes

Cutting out the shark's eyes is a little bit more difficult because you want to keep the printed outline for the craft. You can always choose to use googly eyes or have the kids draw their own. If you want to use the template, here's how:

Print or copy the eye page for as many as you need. Again, you can cut the template in half to save paper. Staple the pages together and cut out multiple eyes at once (You can see this in the video).



Just make sure you line the paper up perfectly before stapling. Hold them up to the light and rotate the paper until they all line up. So, line up all those shark eyeballs and get cutting!

## How to Assemble



**I recommend having a completed shark so the children can see what the final version will look like.**

1. Glue the light blue semi-circle and white semi-circle together to make a full circle.
2. Glue the fins to the back of the circle face – two moon-shaped fins on either side of the face and one triangle fin on the top of the light blue of the face.
3. Glue the red mouth onto the white half of the face.
4. Glue the white teeth onto the red mouth.
5. Glue or draw on the eyes.
6. Don't forget to write your name on the back.

**And you're finished!**



**Step 1:** Glue the light blue semi-circle and white semi-circle together to make a full circle.



**Step 3:** Glue the triangle fin on the top of the light blue of the face.



**Step 5:** Glue the white teeth onto the red mouth.





# Paper Octopus

This octopus is so easy. You can make one for every color of the rainbow.


Which is perfect because a real octopus can change the color and patterns of his skin for some amazing camouflage. There are some really cool videos of this on YouTube. This is also one of my favorite crafts to print or copy directly onto construction paper and let the kids do the craft entirely by themselves.



## Materials


- Octopus Template (below)
- construction paper, colored copy paper, or colored cardstock
- scissors
- stapler (if you're cutting out multiple shapes at a time)
- glue sticks
- black marker (for face and tentacle details)

## **Print the Template and Cut Out the Octopus Shapes**



Once you have the template printed, staple it to multiple sheets of construction paper. This way you can cut out lots of shapes at once. You can stack all of the colors of the rainbow and have multiple colored octopi in no time!

## Optional: Print Template Onto Construction Paper



**You can also print or copy the template directly onto construction paper and have each child cut out the pieces on their own.**

Just trim the construction paper to the 8×10 size using copy paper as a template (you should easily be able to trim multiple sheets at a time).

And if you can adjust your printer settings to “draft” quality or a setting that uses less ink, that might be helpful as well. Construction paper is notorious for absorbing liquid.

Give each child their own page and they can cut and glue the entire craft by themselves.

## How to Assemble




**I recommend having a completed octopus so the children can see what the final version will look like.**

1. Glue all of the legs to the back of the octopus.
2. Draw on the face.
3. Draw dots as tentacle details.
4. Don't forget to write your name on the back.

**And you're finished!**



# T-Rex Dinosaur Craft

T-Rex seems to be every boy's favorite dino. This guy is not scary and he's super easy to make with the template (the hardest part is those scrawny arms). Make a small T-Rex and glue him into a scene or make a large one. Make this craft while you teach kids about dinos and read the funny book "Dinosaurs Love Underpants" by Claire Freedman.




## Materials

- T-Rex Template (below)
- construction paper, colored copy paper, or colored cardstock
- scissors
- stapler
- glue sticks
- black marker (for face, stripes & details)

For this craft you can make the large T-Rex by gluing together the head, body & tail. Or make a small, one-page sized T-Rex.

## **Print the Template and Cut Out the Dino Shapes**



Once you have the template printed, separate the pages based on the final craft colors. Then, staple each template to multiple sheets of construction paper and cut out all of the shapes you need.

## **Optional Step: Cut out smaller T-Rex Shape**

If you choose the small T-Rex, again, you will want to print the template and staple it to multiple sheets of construction paper.

This way you can cut out five to ten T-Rex shapes at a time.



## **How to Assemble Large T-Rex**



**I recommend having a completed T-Rex so the children can see what the final version will look like.**

1. Glue the head behind the body.
2. Glue the tail on behind the body.
3. Glue on the toothy smile.
4. Use a marker to draw on a face and personalize your T-Rex.
5. Don't forget to write your name on the back.

**And you're finished!**

## **How to Assemble Small T-Rex**




I recommend having a completed prehistoric scene so the children can see what the final version will look like.

1. glue a piece of brown construction paper to the bottom of blue paper to create the ground
2. Add scene items like a volcano, tree or cloud with construction paper shapes or draw them with markers.
3. Glue the T-Rex into your scene.
4. Use a marker to add the face, teeth, stripes and personalize your dino.
5. Use crayons or markers to finalize your prehistoric scene.
6. Don't forget to write your name on the back.



Once you have the templates printed, separate the pages based on the final craft colors. Then, staple each template to multiple sheets of construction paper and cut out all of the shapes you need.

## How to Assemble



**I recommend having a chick that is already put together so the children can see what the final version will look like.**

1. Start by adding glue to the bottom of the chick. You want to keep the glue under its wings.
2. Glue the cracked egg shell to the bottom of the chick.
3. Glue or draw on the chick's eyes.
4. Finally, glue on the chick's beak.
5. Don't forget to write your name on the back.

And you're finished!



**Step 1:** Start by adding glue to the bottom of the chick. You want to keep the glue under its wings.



**Step 2:** Glue the cracked egg shell to the bottom of the chick.




**Step 3:** Glue or draw on the chick's eyes.





# Hiding Bunny Craft



## Materials

- scissors
- stapler
- glue sticks
- black marker (for eyes and whiskers)

Once you have the templates printed, separate the pages based on the final craft colors. Then, staple each template to multiple sheets of construction paper and cut out all of the shapes you need.

## How to Assemble



**I recommend having a completed bunny so the children can see what the final version will look like.**

1. Glue the bunny head (circle) behind the green grass -the straight edge is the bottom.
2. Glue the paws onto the front of the grass.
3. Glue the pink ovals onto to the white ears.
4. Glue the ears onto the white head.
5. Glue on the pink triangle nose.
6. Personalize the bunny by drawing on eyes and whiskers.
7. Don't forget to write your name on the back.


